East Jefferson high school of Metairie captured three individual titles and the 1978 Division I State Wrestling Championship Feb. 10-11 at Baker high school.

Twenty-four teams competed in the two day meet with 229 wrestlers veering for the top 12 honors. Only five of the top seeded wrestlers won, while five second seeders won. Three wrestlers were selected as the meet's Outstanding Wrestler as coaches votes were deadlocked with East Jefferson's Craig Seals, West Jefferson's John Hart and Lee's Jim Campbell.



Three in a row Tarpons win state

The South Cameron Tarpons from Creole walked away with the crown for the third consecutive year at the Division II State Tournament held at Baker High School in Baker on Feb. 9

The only Tarpon who failed to place in the tournament was Oscar Garcia at 185 who contributed points to the team total as he won his first two matches and reached the semifinals before being forced to withdraw due to injury.



Second seed Tom Messonnier of Brother Martin, a junior and a runner-up from last year, went after top seeded David Albrecht (22-2) of East Jefferson. Messonnier, who scored in all three periods, looked impressive throughout the tournament, and won 9-6 to take the 126 pound championship.

Second seed John Forgarty (31-2) of Bonnabel was looking to avenge an earlier loss to Jess Calloway, earlier in the season Easley of Baker, the top seed at was pinned by Sunseri roan strick Mossconing took place in the first-speriod, but in the second period with Forgarty up, Easley reversed only to be reversed and put on his back. With no scoring in the first period, Kitziger was down the second period, then escaped and Scariano took himdown to lead 2 -1 going into the third period. One escape later it was all over with Scariano having a 3-1 victory and the 138 pound state championship.

Jim Ravannack, wrestling 145, was the top seed. He faced Maurice Casadaban of Brother Martin, the third seed. Ravan-

nack, who never looks rattled, scored a takedown and a two point nearfall in the initial period, plus a last period escape to win his championship 5-1.

Joe Calloway (24-4) of Baker, having the home town crowd to his advantage, used that and a third period reversal in overtime, to defeat top seeded Joe Sunseri (25-4) of Bonnabel 5-5 OT. 2-1.

Top seed Bart Gutierrez (24-1) of Lee, kept things consistent as he defeated Tony Alas (21-3) of East Jefferson by a score of 5 - 4 for the 167 pound title. Alas' three losses were to Gutierez and every one was by a single point. Gutierrez, a runner-up last year and third as a soph., had three falls and a decision to gain his place in the finals.

Tommy Majors, the 185 pounder of East Jefferson, had then behind 3 - 0 to second seeded his hands full with Catholic's Paul Berggreen in their final bout. Majors scored a second period reversal that stood up to earn him the state championship.

Seals, Mike than Other Delesdernier (6-2, 245 lbs.) of Holy Cross, brought the most impressive credentials to the tournament. Undefeated in 26 matches with 23 falls to his credit, Delesdernier already had a 11-3 decision over Lee's Jim Campbell in the Tiger Invitational.

Campbell, was the second seed with a 12-2 record. (He missed half of the season due to a broken leg.) No scoring took place in the first period, and with Campbell on top the second period Delesdernier could not score. In the third round, Campbell switched and reversed, but Delesdernier reversed with a roll to even the score as they went out of bounds. Campbell again switched, and Delesdernier escaped. With just seven seconds left Campbell got the takedown and the heavyweight title 6 - 3.

This is the fifth year in a row that the heavyweight title has been won by a wrestler weighing less than 210 lbs. (Carroll West Jefferson, Landry, John Miller Lee, Jeff Tanguis Catholic and Campbell.)

Next year Michelli, Nette, Messonnier and Forgarty will have their state titles on the line week in and week out and it will be interesting to see how they can withstand the pressure.



seed, defeated Kitziger 3-1 to earn the title and finish the season 23-3.













stall. Theriot scored the final points of the match in the third period with a nearfall. He completed his Senior season with a record of 23-0 which included a victory the previous week in the finals of the Western Regional Tournament over Johnny Hamilton of Wossman High who finished fourth at 105 in the Division I State Tournament.

Bryan Hawkins of John Ehret won the 112 lb. championship with a 6-3 decision over South Cameron's Norman Cormier.

Bossier's Paul Barnes took the 119 lb. crown by whipping Chris Hannaman of Baton Rouge to give his school the first of its three straight wins in the tournament. The match was a low scoring affair as neither wrestler had a clear cut advantage over the other. Final score of the match was 4-2 with Barnes getting all his points on reversals. The new state champ had previous experience in Nebraska.

In a real war, Lenny Harner of Bossier won the 126 lb. title by defeating South Cameron's two-time state champ, James Boudreaux, a junior, by a criteria decision. Boudreaux opened the match with a takedown, but Harner fought back to lead 6-4 at the end of the first period.

Harner became his own worst enemy in the second period by being penalized for unsportsmanlike conduct, being warned, then penalized for stalling. After falling behind, Harner ended the second period with a takedown to lead 8-7.

The third period looked as though Boudreaux was going to win the match going away when Harner continued to make errors. After falling behind 14-8, Harner, in his first year of wrestling, showed why he was named as the outstanding wrestler by scoring five consecutive points to close within one point. Harner allowed Boudreaux to escape and then scored a takedown at the buzzer to tie the score at 15-15 and send the match into overtime. The overtime ended in a 4-4 tie, and Harner, a junior, won a criteria

decision on the basis of scoring the greater number of escapes in the overtime. This match alone was worth the price of admission.

Terry Washington made it three in a row for Bossier by capturing the 132 lb. title with a 7-5 decision over John Ehret's Robert Bonard. Washington, a senior, had previously wrestled in Germany.

After losing five finals, South Cameron got its second state champion of 1978 when Tony Porche pinned Neville's Curt Stephens in 1:46. Porche claimed the 167 lb. championship after staying off the mats for two years. The senior ended his high school career by winning 14 of his 15 matches this season.

Bill Huff, Neville's only other wrestler, defeated Martin James of St. Martin by the score of 8-2 to claim the 185 lb. title. James scored his only two points on a reversal in the opeing period.

Acadiana's third individual
champion when he pinned the top
seeded heavyweight, Bryan
Bourgeois of Basile, in 2:35. The
unseeded Champagne moved up
from a sixth place finish in last
year's heavyweight division.

Acadiana will be moving up to Division I next year, but both Bossier and John Ehert will again be competing in Division II and will try to stop South Cameron's streak at three straight Division II state championships.

Bossier returns eight starters from this year's squad. Bossier is a Quad A school which was competing for the first time, but many of its wrestlers had competed previously for the first time, but many of its wrestlers had competed previously at various military installations around the world.

The Bearkats' coach, Clark Matkins, is to be congratulated for his team's fine finish this year. He teaches at Bossier bu was not a member of the coaching staff before voluntaring to coach wrestling this year.

John Ehret had no seniors of this year's squad and only two juniors. Ehret was an all-girls school until this year when 1,80 boys transferred from Wes Jefferson. Stars of the futur might be Ehret's two Freshma wrestlers, Claude Numa an Vincent Tessitore. Numa place sixth at 155 while Tessitor placed fourth at 126.







Seals named 'tops' by LWR

Craig Seals, 105-pounder from for the undefeated season." East Jefferson High School in Metairie, has been selected as the 1978 Louisiana Wrestling Roundup Outstanding Wrestler.

Without a doubt, Seals has one of the most impressive records of any Louisiana wrestler with a career total of 88 wins, 6 losses and no ties. Out of those 88 wins, 65 were by falls.

Probably more noteworthy is the fact that Seals won 14 tournament championships with runnerup honors only twice.

Seals was also the only wrestler in the state to go undefeated this year with a 30-0 record and 21 falls.

A close look at his record shows the following:

Sophomore year: 22-4, 17 falls. Junior year: 36-2, 27 falls. Senior year: 30-0, 21 falls. Total: 88-6, 65 falls.

Seals wrestled in the U.S.W.F. Greco tournament last summer and placed seventh. He was a three-time Tiger Invitational winner and a two-time winner in the Big 8, Thanksgiving, Lee Invitational, and the state meet.

Commenting on his success this year Seals said what he considered to be his most successful move: "From the bottom, faking the switch and going to the Oklahoma roll and on top, my most successful move was the cross body ride."

A good deal of Seals' confidence had to do with his ability to handle the pressures of being undefeated. When asked how he psyched himself up, he said, "I try to foresee each match as it comes; in my head I plan on how to put a whippin' on the guy." Even with a fine attitude like that, Seals still admitted he had several difficult matches which threated his 30-0 season.


"One of the most difficult matches I remember," he explained, "was the match I wrestled against Mike Pou from Jesuit for the city tournament. It was really a tough match even though I won 6-0."

Like last year's LWR outstanding wrestler David Gaffney, Seals agreed that a key point in holding up under pressure was to "make the undefeated season work for you, and not you work

Seals has been contacted by LSU Coach Sciacchetano as a college recruit but nothing definite has been set; however, he plans to go to college in the fall and enter the College of Business and wrestle. "I'd be thrilled to be

contacted by anybody up North," he said. Hopefully his dream will come true.

Seals will receive a beautiful lamenated plaque by the Roundup at a later date for his efforts in the sport of wrestling.





Top state wrestlers picked

The Division I Outstanding Wrestlers were selected by coaches of the teams participating in the Division I state tournament and when all the votes were counted there was a three way tie for the honor.

After looking over the

credentials of the three selected no one has to wonder why they were selected.

East Jefferson's Craig Seals, two-time state champion and once a state runner-up, is the only wrestler to go undefeated in the state this year. He has a career record of 88-6-0, with 65 victories coming by the pin. Winner of 14 tournaments, he placed seventh in the U.S.F.W. Greco-Roman tournament in Iowa City last summer.

John Hart of West Jefferson also was a two-time state champion and placed third as a sophomore. He carries a career record of 86-9-2 with seven folkstyle tournament wins to his credit. As a sophomore he placed ninth in the NAAU Junior Olympic freestyle tournament; as a junior he placed second in the NAAU Junior Olympic Greco-Roman tournament, and in his senior year he won the Sunshine Open (USWF). Hart also carries a 3.25 grade point average.

Lee's Jim Campbell, moving to heavyweight this year after two seasons at 185, started slow due to a broken leg. But after being in a cast for eleven weeks, Campbell started right to work and after only one week's work, placed second in the Tiger Invitational. Campbell's career record is 52-13-0 with 34 falls. He was the 185 lb. state runner-up as a sophomore and placed third last year.

The Division II outstanding wrestler was junior Lenny Harner of Bossier City High School. This was Harner's first year to wrestle and his season record was 19 wins, five losses, with 14 falls, and the Division II 126 pound championship.

Clark Matkins, Bossier wrestling coach, said that, "Harner is the most dedicated kid I have ever worked with and he has a tremendous amount of confidence in himself" as he showed in the state finals in the overtime referee's decision win. He came from behind for the win.

We know there were other outstanding wrestlers in the state tournament. These, however, not only wrestled well in the tournament to earn the honor, but also extremely well throughout their careers.



Tigers take SEC meet

The Chinese Bandits stole the show -- four weight class titles, wrestler of the year honors, coach of the year honors, and the Southeastern Conference wrestling championship.

Athens, Ga. was the scene of the crime as the Tigers rolled up 74¾ points to out distance runner-up Florida by 121/2 points. Auburn, Alabama, Tennessee, defending champion Kentucky and Georgia followed.

Coach Larry Sciacchetano went back 20 years into history on the Tiger campus and retrieved an old tradition which had personified L.S.U. to the New Jersey native. He named his group the Chinese Bandits like those of football fame, a defensive unit that led the 1958 Tiger football team to a national championship.

"We had those Chinese Bandit t-shirts made up, and I've never seen a group take so much pride in anything."

It had been seven years since an L.S.U. wrestling team won the conference championship and it had been three years since any individual titles were won. But Coach "Shack" and his "Fantastic Freshmen" corp were not awed by defending champs Kentucky and powerful Florida. Three frosh won their first titles - Jeff Parker 167, Eric Moll 177, and George Atiyeh HWT, with Moll and Atiyeh both beating defending S.E.C. champs.

Senior co-captain Mike Chinn won his first S.E.C. title at 134 by forfeit over two-time defending champion Kurt Mock of Kentucky. Chinn actually has two conference titles to his name as two years ago while at the University of Oklahoma he won the "Big 8" conference. He has been ranked second in the nation this year and was chosen to wrestle in the East-West Classic earlier in February.


Other place winners were freshmen Chris Wentz 118 (3rd), Kyle Grunwald 142 (4th), and Jerry Rodriguez 190 (3rd) plus

Atiyeh, the 6-2, 240 pounder, put the icing on the cake when he was named the S.E.C. wrestler of the year after he decisioned defending champ Harold Smith of Kentucky 11-8. Smith, third last year in the nationals, was in trouble and almost pinned at the buzzer. Smith also was ranked second in the country this year and was undefeated with a 14-0 record and 11 falls.

Earlier in the year Atiyeh had 360 pound Jimmy Jackson (twotime National Champion from Okla. State) 6-1 before the huge Oklahoman pinned him. Big George, a first-team high school All-American from Allentown, Pa., was a two-time Pennsylvania state champ and was 31-0 as a senior. He also lettered as a defensive tackle on L.S.U.'s Sun Bowl team last season.

The S.E.C. sends 22 wrestlers to the nationals March 16-18 at the University of Maryland. Champions and runners-up in each of the ten weight classes go, plus two wild card choices of the conference coaches.

If there was a disappointment at the tournament, Jerry Rodriguez's heartbreaking loss in the semi-finals and then not being selected as a wild card, really shocked Schack as he felt Rodriguez ranked third in the nation, deserved to go.








